From a Railway Carriage

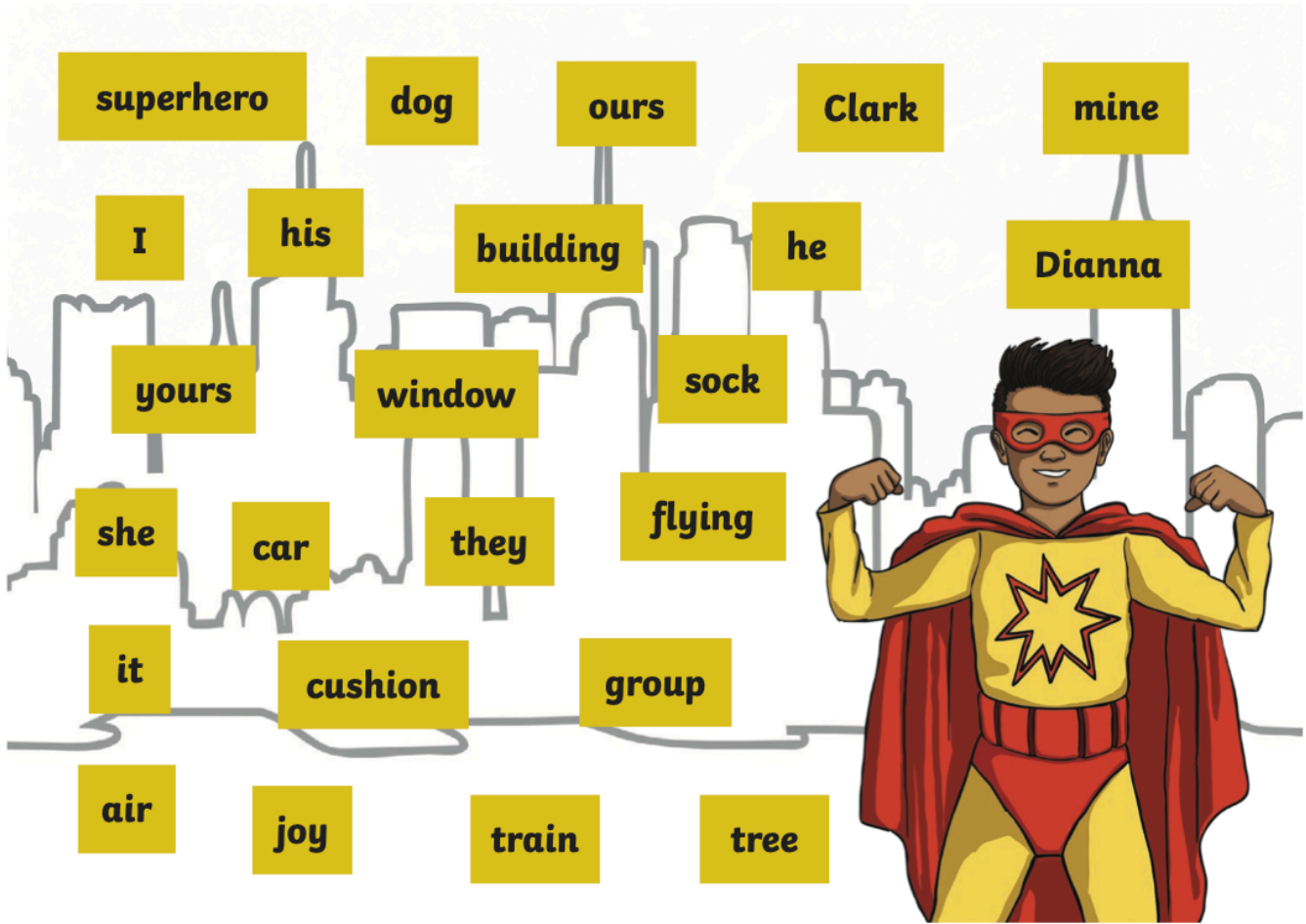
by Robert Louis Stevenson
